Today the conference featured eight concurrent sessions focusing on the conference subthemes, two special sessions including the Irrigation Production Forum and the Financing Irrigation Forum, seventeen poster presentations, an accompanying persons riverboat cruise, various International Executive Committee (IEC) Meetings including the C-CONGR and IYPeF Sessions as well as numerous IEC Working Group Meetings. We also had additional delegates join us with over 520 registrants participating in the conference. What follows are a number of highlights of the conference on 14 August 2018.

Special Sessions: Irrigation Production Forum and Financing Irrigation Forum

The Irrigation Production Forum focused on the challenges and opportunities that irrigation producers face in a changing world landscape. The role of irrigation producers in the production of high quality agricultural products will be even more important with increasing global population needs. The excellent line-up of speakers included irrigation producers and water managers from several countries around the globe.

The key take away message from the Financial Irrigation Forum is that government support is necessary to support infrastructure development and rehabilitation. Canada is not alone in requiring federal and provincial government support but it was noted that Canada has a considerable amount or high ratio of private investments in water infrastructure when compared to other countries. From the participating panelists it was evident that cost-sharing between private industry/irrigators and governments varies considerably around the world.

ICID Young Professional e-Forum (ICID IYPeF)

The ICID Young Professional e-Forum (ICID IYPeF) 3rd meeting took place this morning. The IYPeF meeting aimed to present the report on the actions taken regarding the 2018 IYPeF agenda. Furthermore, the meeting aimed to collect the IYP needs on the upcoming 2019 agenda topics for e-discussions and webinars. Attendance was enriched by young professionals and by the participation of Eng. Felix B. Reindeers, President of ICID, and ICID managers attending with IYP who contributed to the brainstorming session for the 2019 agenda.

ICID Meeting C-CONGR

Australia, India and Indonesia presented on their upcoming events during this meeting. In addition, there was a review of the current ICID criteria and procedures when hosting an ICID event. Key issues raised in the discussion included the current cost-share formula and currency-related challenges.



International Conference Concurrent Sessions

There were eight concurrent sessions held today including two sessions on Irrigation & Water Resources Management in Transboundary Basins, two sessions on Managing Competing Water Demands, two sessions on Climate Change and its Impact on Agriculture, Irrigation and Drainage, one session on Irrigation Water Footprint and one session on Drainage and Flood Control Structures.

winters followed by short snowmelt periods that may result in wet, saturated soils and local or regional flooding which means that management practices need to be adapted to address the hydrological aspects of cold-region climates.

Key messages of the sessions focusing on transboundary management included that timely irrigation is required to enhance economic growth, that decision makers in transboundary river basins need to be informed on how investment in irrigation enhance the shared economic benefits. There also is a need to understand the impacts of climate on irrigation and future agriculture expansions at different administrative levels (provincial, watersheds, basin wide) of transboundary rivers as well as, that optimal irrigation is needed to minimize water losses specially under future stress and scarcity due to climate change and population growth.

Presentations in the sessions that focused on climate change generally recognized that

climate change is likely to lead to increased temperatures, altered precipitation patterns, and more extreme weather events. Regions that are dependent on rainfall for agriculture will be particularly susceptible to these changes and this means that irrigation demands most likely will continue to increase in a changing climate. It was also noted that as global populations continue to grow, improved irrigation efficiencies will need to be combined with the development of new irrigated areas.

The session on Drainage and Flood Control Structures highlighted drainage studies and projects in Nordic countries like Finland and Canada. The hydrology of these regions is characterized by long, cold
